

munity is for all students to go to post secondary schools such as college, trade school, and life skills programs. The board represents the community because the community votes for the members. Thus, the relationship between district/board, community, parents, and families should be good.

Mr. Harrison defines a successful board meeting as one where voices come together to form a consensus and the superintendent carries out the ideas and opportunities to the district. The reason school boards are necessary is because they govern oversight and give directions. There are not many challenges but the state level can create challenges, such as when the state puts a freeze on the monies given to the

school.

The school board had come to the conclusion to renovate the school to save money in the long term. The school renovation was very positive. The S.T.E.A.M lab brings students up to date on technology in order to be competitive.

Mr. Harrison's proudest accomplishment is being part of this third renovation, students going to post secondary education, and of being a 1979 FHS Alumnus. There are no specific goals to speak of at this point, just having a group of kids moving on. Mr. Harrison's hobbies outside of school are pastoring and serving on five additional boards.


Golden Girls dazzle Do you have what it takes?

Golden Girls, also referred to as Danceline, was founded in the mid 1900's. A part of the band, Golden Girls includes ten members including two captains. Tryouts are held in the beginning of May. Prospective members must perform two "stand dances," which are cheers that are performed during football games.

Official practice for Golden Girls begins in early June. From the months of June to August the coach, captains, and members have three months to construct and learn four different performances: the flag, kick line, dance, and parade march.

The Golden Girls perform alongside the Marching Band during the seven-minute halftime show of the football games. In addition to the football games, the Marching Band and Golden Girls perform in Mercer County Band Night, Kennywood Founders Day, Labor Day, Veterans Day, and Light up Night Parades. 


Get your *Insta*Stories Ready...

Alternative schooling: tough choices, tough consequences

At this halfway point through the school year, are you reflecting on your progress throughout the past two quarters? Perhaps you feel that you are having some problems, or that you are not working to your potential. Some students have questioned whether or not alternative schooling might be right for them. Other students have been placed in another institution on an involuntary basis (the latter pertains to cases where disciplinary action has been required).

One voluntary form of alternative schooling is online schooling, also called Cyber School. In order to qualify for this option, you must be of school age and have a parent or guardian with-

draw you from your current school placement. A couple of resources that you will need to start this program are a laptop to sign in everyday and obviously an internet connection. You will be required to watch videos to learn new lessons and are able to communicate through video or email to teachers if you are having a hard time with the lesson. Many different people use this online program. At the end of the program, you will have fees to pay even if you withdraw.

A student that wants to be successful in Cyber School must have excellent time management skills and learn well autonomously. Students often find this option to be much more difficult than they had anticipated.

A second option is Crossroads School, located right here in Farrell, PA. There are several different ways to enroll or be assigned to this school. One way is to be sent there in the juvenile department, as assigned by the court. A youth agency can make the decision that this placement is in a student's best interest. Finally, a parent can voluntary send a child to Crossroads if and when it is agreed upon by the district..

Crossroads students must be between the ages of 10 to 18 years of age. This program is great for kids who find it difficult to work or learn in a traditional classroom with many students. During the first week, a student is required to attend an

entire day program from 8 am until 8 pm. This school is broken up into two different buildings, one for boys and the other one for girls. This means that during a school day the genders are never mixed.

Keystone serves students from all different communities. This school, located in Greenville, PA, can be for kids who live there on their own or that are incarcerated there. Personally, I found Keystone to be the more rigid and severe of the two behavioral reassignment options. They have different buses that pick you up from your district and drop you off. Additionally, you can be any age to attend this school.
