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


To me, some people take this as an advantage. I believe some people use this to


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AND THOSE ANNOUNCEMENT VOICES BELONG TO....

L.T.I. field trip: TRADE PROGRAMS for students

Laurel Technical Institute, better known as LTI, is a trade program that will get you certified in many different fields. Select Juniors and Seniors visited the Hermitage campus of LTI with Guidance Counselor, Ms. Titus. There are also campuses in Meadville and Sharon, PA. They all offer similar programs, with specific options varying slightly by location.

LTI has many different fields such as nursing, message therapy, pharmacy technician and cosmetology that many prospective students are interested in. The two main programs they showed us during this February field trip were welding and electric, because they are the two biggest programs they offer. The experience included hands on demonstrations and Farrell students participated and learned about the importance of the safety measures and equipment involved.

LTI will accept any student that has a high school diploma or GED. students do not have to take the SAT or ACT in order to be accepted. The most important requirement for this training program is attendance. As long as you can show up, they help you to learn your trade.

Once high school is over I plan to go to Laurel technical Institute because it is a "hands on" trade school. Originally, I thought that I would have liked to be certified in cosmetology and am now looking more seriously at welding because I love this type of hands on work. Welding is 10% book work and 90% hands on. I would like to pursue this career because it suits me as there are many different styles. If you don't want to go to a 4 year college, a viable alternative is trade school. They have a lot to offer and programs take much less time.
