French and Spanish students traveled to Slippery Rock University on Tuesday, October 8, to compete in Levels I-III grammar and culture exams. Students had the opportunity to take online exams competing against schools as far as Pittsburgh and New York.

In addition to taking the tests, students explored cultures and languages throughout several scavenger hunt activities lead by SRU students and professors. In the Spanish room, students created their own papel picado, a decoration used in Mexican celebrations and holidays. The art of eating with chopsticks was highlighted by a "chopstick challenge," where students raced to move watermelon seeds using this common Japanese utensil. Students had the opportunity to dress in traditional Iranian clothing and learned the spelling of their first names in Arabic script with SRU students minoring in Arabic Studies. Our FHS participants perused

French and African writers and gathered information about dozens of Study Abroad Programs offered at the university.

Students are selected to compete based on excellent grades in French and Spanish as well as overall positive attitude and consistent participation in classes.

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

Mr. Justin Lewis is a new member of our teaching staff. He is the STEAM Teacher. Mr. Lewis received his undergraduate degree in Biology at Penn State University. He earned his master's degree at Slippery Rock University for Education and Applied Research and Statistics. Mr. Lewis was the Athletic Director and is still currently the Track and Field coach at Greenville High School. His areas of interest outside of school are hunting and fishing.

Mr. Lewis decided to apply to teach at Farrell because he sees potential in our students here at Farrell. He is also excited to be able to work in Farrell because our new STEAM Laboratory is one of the best in Western Pennsylvania. Mr. Lewis' goal is to get as many students involved in the STEAM program as possible. One thing that he loves about teaching is seeing students learn new things that they otherwise did not even realize that they had an interest.

Mr. Lewis gave us a brief rundown on some of the impressive equipment to which the students and faculty have access in the new laboratory:

1 Stratasys F120 3D Printer: capable of printing with 2 different types of extrusion materials

2 Ultimaker 3s: capable of printing simplistic two material 3D designs

1 Epilog Laser Mini: capable of laser engraving Wood, Plastic and soft metals

1 Epilog FusionPro: capable of advanced engraving and laser cutting

1 Roland Poster cutter/
printer: can print vinyl posters
and stickers

1 Roland MDX-50 - capable of cutting material on both the X, Y and Z axis (as used in Dentistry!)

1 Clothing Heat Press: can press vinyl material onto clothing

1 Clothing Embroidery Machine: can apply stitch embroidery designs to clothing

1 Techno CNC Machine: capable of cutting large designs such as furniture or 3D signs

Students study simple machines





October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Cancer is a disease characterized by abnormal cells. Breast Cancer starts in cell groups. The Cancer cells invade the surrounding tissue and may spread to more and different body parts of the body. Women's Breast Cancer is caused by damage to the cell's DNA.

Many risky lifestyle choices can lead up to Breast Cancer. Some such behaviors are lack of physical activity, poor diet, being overweight or obese, radiation to the chest, and drinking alcohol. Many women with breast cancer will have pain, although some do not. The pain can be discomfort, tenderness, and that pain can be experienced from around the breast area extending to the underarm region. The pain can be treated by medication such as: Digitalis Preparation, Methyldopa (Aldomet), Anadrol, and Chlorpromazine.

There are several emerging treatments for breast cancer. A Florida woman, who was given only five months to live, is now declared cancer

free due to one such experimental treatment. Judy Perkins is now a survivor of breast Cancer. After her diagnosis with advanced breast cancer, it spread very quickly through her body. During the treatment, they pumped 90 billion can-
