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

SENIOR PROJECT SHOWCASE





ARCHITECTURE

Do you like drawing and designing things? Well in that case you should take up studying architecture. Here is some information about architecture. Architects design structures like factories, shopping centers, houses, office buildings, and etc. At most times architects work in an office. Architects also have to meet with clients to draft plans, figure out the cost estimates, get permit applications, and help clients make agreements with contractors. Cloud-based technologies and 3D software programs are some of the things that architects use. There are many different types of Architects, here are a few examples below.

A **Residential architect** is designing and building non-commercial living spaces and properties such as townhomes, apartment complexes, family homes, and many more. A **Commercial architect** prepares to design commercial buildings, offices, hotels, hospitals, museums, and other non-residential properties. A **Landscape architect** designs natural environments like public parks, gardens, college campuses, and etc. There are more architects to add to the list but these are just a few. All states require certificates, registration, or a license for the practice of architecture. Those who want to receive an architecture degree have two options: either a five year undergraduate degree in architecture referred as B. Arch or a post college master's program known as M. Arch. A career in architecture usually takes five to eight years of higher education, maybe even more just depending on which path one chooses.

After high school, I want to go into the nursing field. I plan on going to Clarion University. I'm thinking about going into the ASN in nursing to start off in training. It's a two year degree that provides the graduate with a foundation for further study at the baccalaureate level. The reason I chose this career is because I thought it would be a great experience because I love to help people, and I feel the nursing field is something I would be good at. Growing up, I always enjoyed helping people. Also, nurses and doctors are needed everywhere, meaning you are not limited in where you choose to live. The nursing field is also very diverse. There are travel nurses, Nurse Practitioners, Certified Medical Assistants, and Neonatal Nurses, to name a few.

Here are some different courses you can take: The certified nursing assistant (CNA) takes up to 4-12 weeks to complete. A CNA is a non-degree diploma offered at community colleges and vocational schools where you learn how to provide basic healthcare services and help patients with their daily activities. It's the fastest way to qualify for an entry level nursing position. Licensed Practical Nurse/ Licensed Vocational Nurse (LPN/ LVN) is a 12-18 month commitment. A LPN/ LVN is for students who want to enter the nursing field without the time and cost of earning a college degree. An Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) is two years. The ADN uses the minimum degree requirement for becoming a registered nurse that includes studying science related courses such as Anatomy, Biology, Chemistry, and Physiology. Then there's a bachelors of science in nursing (BSN) that takes up to 4 years. The BSN is a four year degree designed for RNs who want to pursue supervisory roles and qualify for higher paying jobs. The Master's of Science in nursing is an additional two years post graduation. The last job target would be the doctor of nursing practice (DNP) that's 4 years post grad.

Although many students haven't had the chance to be taught by Mrs. Armour, we have all grown to know and love her. Students know her for many reasons, whether it be as one of their teachers, or the Lead Teacher for their grade. Even if they didn't have the chance to have her, most students have only great things to say about her. These are some of the reasons that I decided she was the perfect fit for this issue's Teacher Spotlight.

Recently, I had the honor of interviewing Mrs. Armour on different aspects of her life, in and out of the school building. I learned a lot that many students may not know. To start off the interview, I asked what classes and courses she teaches, with this she answered with how she teaches learning support English for grades 7th-12th, and Learning Support Science for grades 9th-12th. Following this, I asked where she went to school after high school. She answered this by explaining that she went to Slippery Rock University to earn her Bachelors in Elementary Ed and Special Ed, she then followed this by saying she went to Saint Joseph's University for her Master's in Special Ed. Much like many teachers, she didn't start off her career here, she was originally a substitute that worked at Greenville, Reynolds, Jamestown, and lastly here, before getting a spot as a full time teacher. What many students may not know is that she has been teaching her for almost 15 years.

To get a better idea of who she is outside of the school building, I began to ask questions about her life outside of the building. This led me to find out that she had been married for fifteen years, to her husband Mike, and they then went on to have three kids. As a family, they own a concession trailer, that they take to multiple fairs, and sell French fries and lemonade, as well as working graduation parties. They are also a very involved family within their community, her kids play multiple sports, consisting of soccer, baseball, cross country, and track, which allows her to be a sports mom. When she's not doing any of these, she stated that she likes to make things with her *Cricut*, and be creative.

To see how she is as a teacher, I asked her if there were any techniques that she uses in the classroom to build a better relationship with her students. When asked this she stated that she likes to build strong relationships with the students, and ones where she can be

there for them if they need someone. Another thing I wanted to know was ways that she's different from other teachers, and things she wished other teachers did more of. She gave a couple answers to this, one of which being that she feels teachers need to listen to students, they need to listen to their needs and meet them where they are, not only as a student, but as a person. She also wanted to let students know some things that they take the wrong way, one of which being one that I found many students should realize. She wants her students to know that when she's tough on them she's not being mean or rude, she's making them be who they want to be, and making sure that they are succeeding. She also wants her students to know that they need to be prepared for anything and that's adulting stuff, but it's something that everyone can get through as long as they try.

Since she has taught her for 15 years, she has had the opportunity to do and change many things. She has helped with the plays and musicals, which she loved, due to the one on one interaction with the students. She also made an impact as the Lead Teacher so that it's not only focused on detention, but also on adding student rewards, such as the holiday party, end of the year events, and Honor Roll incentives.

Mrs. Armour is one of the most loved, and known teachers. She also continues to inspire and encourage many with not only her ways of teaching, but also herself as a person. She is by far, one of the most favorite teachers serving in our district.



Student Creativity Abounds at HOPECAT

Are you creative? Do you have a lot of free time and nothing to do with it? Do you need a creative outlet that lets you express yourself? If you answered yes to any of these questions then you should consider joining HopeCAT.

HopeCAT is a program that inspires students to be creative by providing access to material for free. HopeCAT offers printmaking, ceramics, and painting classes. Their program takes place in two semesters, Fall and Spring. You can take more than one class at a time.

These classes are open to students in 7th through 12th grade. You do not have to know anything about any of these subjects because they will teach it to you.

Printmaking is the art of taking an image and transferring it onto something. There are multiple techniques used to do this, such as etching, engraving, screen-printing, and woodcut. All of these techniques are taught at HopeCAT. Ceramics is anything that was made from clay and heated at high temperatures. In the ceramic department, you can make sculptures, dining ware, or decorative pieces, such as vases.

In painting classes, you learn about different painting techniques, textures, and colors. At the end of every semester, you get the chance to sell your product. You price it at whatever you want, then you name it, and after that HopeCAT will handle the rest. HopeCAT takes a small percentage of the money as a way to support their program.

"The Hope Center for Arts & Technology is a non-profit organization based on Bill Strickland's belief that environment shapes behavior. Hope-CAT classes are held in a contemporary, high-tech, newly renovated school on the West Hill in Sharon, PA (The former Sacred Heart Elementary

School). Their school is filled with art and light and is fully equipped with classrooms, computer labs, and art studios to serve students, both youth and adult, throughout the region." (HopeCAT)
